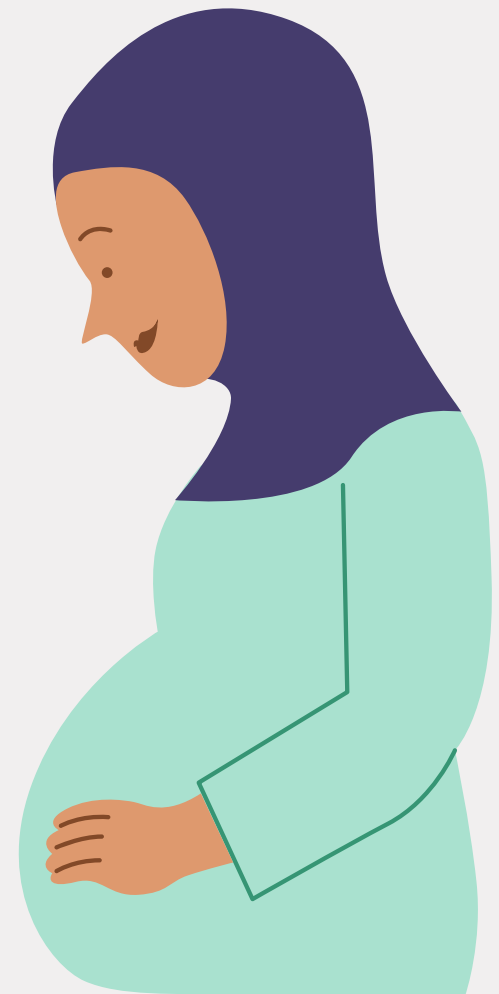


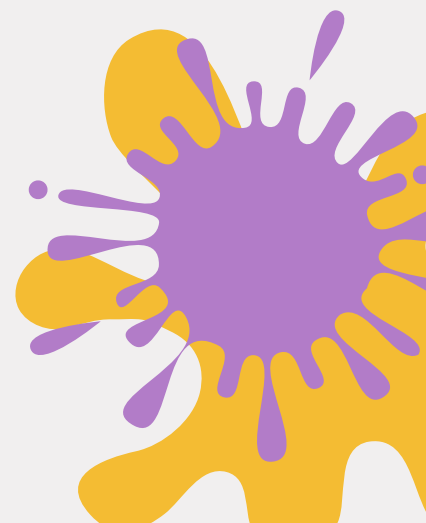
Immunization week: vaccines and fertility

Vaccines are a fundamental tool to protect people against COVID-19 and to save lives. You may experience some side effects after getting vaccinated, which are signs that your body is building protection.

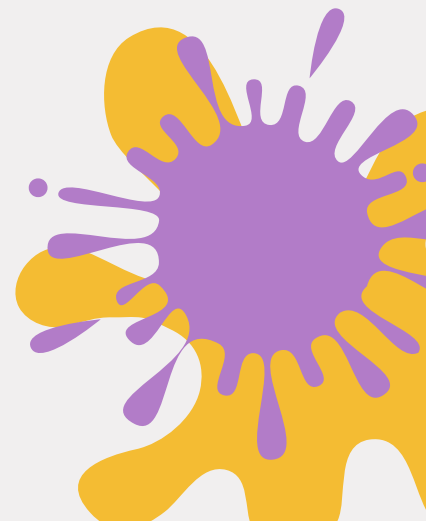




Vaccines have any effect on fertility?

A myth often circulating is that around infertility and COVID-19 vaccines

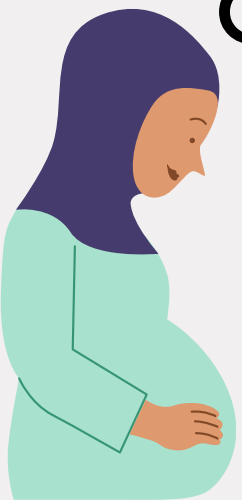
There's no scientific evidence that COVID-19 vaccines have any effect on fertility, either in men or women.





There is no way that COVID-19 vaccines can interfere with the functioning of the reproductive organs of either men or women.

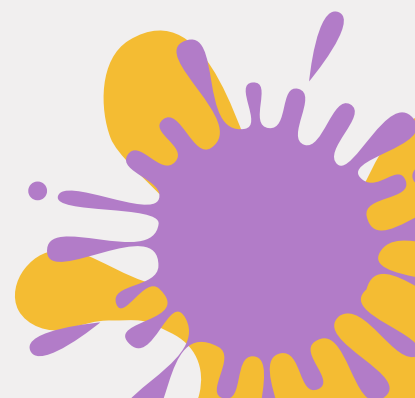
For this reason, COVID-19 vaccines can be taken by people trying to get pregnant. Getting vaccinated beforehand is actually very important to protect you and your baby from COVID during pregnancy.
